Ee-JRIF will be developed and promoted to become a leading rated, multi-disciplinary and refereed international journal on knowledge, research and innovation foresight for the development and transformation of Ethiopian society, economy, communities, states and citizens regardless of gender, age, ethnic origin, religion and any other differences. The Ethiopian local, problems, challenges and issues however varied they may be will be explored by Ethiopians who now find themselves scattered around the world. This journal will bring Ethiopians around the world to join the global knowledge, research and innovation observatory to create knowledge channels that facilitate bonding, communication and exchange between what exists in the sphere of the abroad and also that of at home for visioning the future with foresight and intelligence.

Ee-JRIF encourages research output to be published covering a range of areas such as the role of knowledge, research and innovation in the processes of Ethiopia's transformation and development. Research on how agriculture, industry, university, community, business and Government make systemic interactions and linkages in the context of bringing about Ethiopia's broader socio-economic development will be covered. The exploration of how producer-users interact in Ethiopia to transform Ethiopia into a viable and functioning society, economy and state will be undertaken. Critiques of how outside help has often hindered domestic innovation

will be open to investigation and reflection. Specific themes on food, biodiversity, forestry, health, water, land, agriculture, horticulture, crops, and a variety of necessary plants and species will be prioritized. Further 3 research will be undertaken by exploring co-evolutions, broad-based innovations and indigenous knowledge systems in the context of Ethiopian development including how new technologies (nano, bio, info, cogno) influence development, transformation and life style changes in Ethiopia. In addition scientific papers will be welcome from those who explore sustainable use of resources, infrastructure, electricity, telecommunication and energy uses, and those who also explore conflicts, violence, wars both internal and regional, emergence of institutions and practices to make Ethiopia learn to self-govern for development and human wellbeing in an environment of environment and human justice.

Ethiopia has contributed to Africa in ways that none can challenge or take away how much it paid for holding the African resistance and independence imagination. There is thus a need to put the record straight regarding Ethiopia's over five hundred years epic struggle against the attempts by outside powers to colonize the country and highlighting Ethiopia's historic role in holding the primary place in Africa's overall liberation imagination. The relevance of this to complete the unfinished business of African liberation will be highlighted so that Ethiopia's historic role is fully acknowledged.

Agriculture Selected for the First Issue of Ee-JRIF

For the first issue of Ee-JRIF we have selected, along with education and health, agriculture as the main theme for soliciting, reviewing and publishing the peer reviewed papers.

We think that agriculture is critical for Ethiopia's future. In spite of the declarations made by both the UN system, the African Union and even specific Governments, agriculture remains still in a state where a country like Ethiopia has not been able to achieve food security. Every year around the Christmas period, there has been reports of food shortages and scarcity reported by both the World Food Programme and the Government in Ethiopia. Very often the numbers of people that need food aid reported by the World Food Programme is bigger than those reported by the local Government. This is a recurrent dilemma that has defined the country and given it a brand name that it is incapable of feeding itself.

Given this concern, it is nothing but natural for the first maiden issue of EE-JRIF we have selected agriculture to provide an overriding concentration on issues and themes, we hope that real knowledge that can make a difference to both learning and policy, will be produced mainly by Ethiopian researchers scattered around the world. This will help create a knowledge, research and high—level culture that can contribute to the society and bring all the knowledge producers of Ethiopians in the world to make impact to the lives of the people in Ethiopia constructively by hopefully also creating viable knowledge-anchored enduring networks.

According to the Food and Agriculture Organisation of the UN, "the total amount of available food is not the problem; the world produces plenty of food to feed everyone." (Tom Tietenberg & Lynne Lewis, Environmental Economics & Policy, Sixth edition Pearson Publishers,

p.226) The fact that the world produces enough food has not changed the fact that countries like Ethiopia have been categorized amongst the large number of countries that cannot feed themselves. (ibid)

In Ethiopia there are now reports that something like 3 % of the arable cultivable land is being leased to foreign companies. The extent to which such company ownership may help solve the food security problem or undermine it is still open. This leased land does decrease the supply of land to serve food production if the companies concentrate in changing such arable land to commercial exports. This new development which is affecting not only Ethiopia but also much of the rest of Africa is a new development and requires close investigation.

It remains a fact that no matter how this new lease of arable land works out, the overriding objective all Ethiopians whoever they are and wherever they may be is to turn Ethiopian agriculture productive and change the country from food insecure to a food security land. Failure to achieve this goal is failure to reverse the famine brand name the country has unfortunately been described for a generation now. Anyone who cannot understand this challenge is likely to face a negative judgment by both history and commonsense. After
